WHAT THE <u>PROJECT SIERRA MADRE</u> BALLOT INITIATIVE WILL DO AND WHAT MISINFORMATION IS BEING SPREAD IN SUPPORT OF IT

To become law, the Project Sierra Madre ballot initiative must:

- Be qualified for the ballot through the petition signatures of 10% of Sierra Madre voters (approximately 860 signatures)
- The signatures must be verified as those of registered Sierra Madre voters.
- Once on the ballot, the initiative must pass by 50% plus 1 of the votes cast.

What the initiative would do if passed:

- Rezone the entire Mater Dolorosa parcel from Institutional to Hillside Residential.
- Redefine all existing facilities on the property as "Non-Conforming Uses" even though they have legally been on the property for decades.
- Require any change of use on the property, or the development of any parcel of the property, to adhere to the requirements of the City's Hillside Zoning ordinance.

For example, if Mater Dolorosa wished to expand the Retreat Center into a portion of its parking lot, it could not because it would be a change of use requiring an approval it cannot get because the Hillside Ordinance:

- Does not allow institutional uses like Mater Dolorosa.
- Allows only one home per lot, and the Mater Dolorosa property is just one lot.
- Limits property expansions to no more than 3,000 square feet.

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This ballot initiative represents <u>unjust and unfair discrimination</u> <u>against a religious institution</u> and jeopardizes Mater Dolorosa's ability to continue to serve the Sierra Madre community, as it has for nearly a century.

Project Sierra Madre is misinforming the residents of Sierra Madre by:

- **Ignoring the constitutional right of landowners** to develop their property in compliance with existing laws.
- Saying that people do not trust the City Council, but the vast majority of residents support both the Council and the concept of representative government.
- Not mentioning that The Meadows will be like other neighborhoods in Sierra Madre, with similar architecture and density (number of homes per acre).
- Not mentioning that The Meadows will be the most sustainable community in Sierra Madre's history.
- Saying that The Meadows will impact City water supplies, but the City is requiring that The Meadows not add any additional water demand.
- Saying the Meadows will increase fire risk, but by implementing the City's wildfire protection requirements, the Meadows will reduce the chance that wildfires will spread to nearby homes.
- Saying the Meadows will increase traffic without saying the traffic study conducted for the City shows streets will continue to function without greater congestion.

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
